

BRACHYCATALECTIC

Meaning: Brachycatalectic refers to a line of poetry that is metrically incomplete, typically lacking one or more syllables at the end, resulting in a truncated form of the expected meter.

1. The poem's final line, though intended to be iambic tetrameter, ended up being brachycatalectic, missing a syllable.
2. The professor pointed out the brachycatalectic nature of the fragment, suggesting a possible lost line.

9. Although generally adhering to strict metrical patterns, the author sometimes utilized brachycatalectic lines for artistic effect.
10. The translator struggled to maintain the original poem's brachycatalectic rhythm in the target language.

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
