

CAVEATING

Meaning: CAVEATING: Present participle of 'caveat,' meaning to qualify or limit a statement or agreement by adding a specific condition or warning.

1. The lawyer began the contract by caveating the terms to ensure both parties understood their responsibilities.
2. She accepted the promotion, caveating her decision with the condition that her work-life balance would be maintained.
3. The scientist published her findings, caveating the results with a note about the potential for further research.
4. In his speech, he was careful to avoid making promises, caveating his statements with realistic expectations.
5. The investor expressed interest in the startup, caveating his enthusiasm with the need for a thorough financial review.
6. He agreed to the proposal, caveating his acceptance with a few necessary adjustments to the timeline.
7. The teacher provided feedback, caveating her comments to encourage growth rather than discourage the student.
8. She praised the team's performance, caveating her remarks by pointing out areas for improvement.
9. The author issued a statement, caveating her claims with the acknowledgment of possible biases in her perspective.
10. During the meeting, he shared his ideas, caveating them with a reminder of the project's limitations.
