

CIRCUMSTANTIAL

Meaning: CIRCUMSTANTIAL: relating to evidence or information that suggests something is true but does not directly prove it.

1. The evidence presented was largely circumstantial, making it difficult to draw any definitive conclusions.
2. During the trial, the defense argued that the circumstantial nature of the witness testimonies weakened the prosecution's case.
