

SYLLOGISM

Meaning: Syllogism is a form of reasoning in which a conclusion is drawn from two given or assumed propositions (premises), typically consisting of a major premise, a minor premise, and a conclusion.

1. A classic example of a syllogism is the argument that all humans are mortal, Socrates is a human, therefore Socrates is mortal.
2. In philosophy classes, students often grapple with the structure and validity of syllogisms to strengthen their reasoning skills.
3. The detective employed a syllogism to deduce that if the suspect was at the crime scene and the crime occurred, then the suspect could be involved.
4. Her presentation on logical fallacies highlighted how misusing syllogisms can lead to faulty conclusions.
5. The syllogism, with its clear premises and conclusion, serves as a fundamental tool in formal logic.
